THIS WEEKS REFLECTION FROM FR JONATHON

Today we hear the third main part of Jesus' instruction known as the Sermon on the Plain. Both the Gospel and our First Reading from Ecclesiasticus make the same point: if your heart is good and true, everything else will fall into place. Whilst we should never, and in fact can never, judge another person because we do not know his or her heart - "God alone knows every heart" (I Kings 8:39) - we can make judgments about good or bad actions and words, and Jesus urges us to recognise one

from the other. It is so hard to know what is in one's own heart – to recognise the "plank" that may be there, inhibiting right vision and judgment. And yet we are still so confident that we can see and judge the failings of others!

The ability to speak allows us to communicate with each other in ways that can be nurturing, loving, and healing. Alternatively, it can be used to manipulate others, to undermine, to lie and flatter. Speech enables us to reprove and criticise the actions of others, even when what we say ourselves is often far removed from what we are or do. None of us are completely innocent when it comes to there being a gap between what we are and what we say. But as we endeavour to conform our lives to Christ's, the gap between the standards we uphold and our actions can at least be bridged by our humble acknowledgment of the fact. Humility is the antidote to hypocrisy. Humility is about truthfulness: not putting ourselves any higher, or lower, than we really are. It is about removing the plank from our own eye first.

WE KEEP IN OUR PRAYERS

POPE FRANCIS

We continue to keep in our prayers the Holy Father, Pope Francis. We commend him to the prayers of Our Lady and St Joseph. The Holy Rosary will be prayed 30 minutes before Weekend Masses. St Teresa's Church will remain open throughout the day 8am - 7pm for private prayer.

ASH WEDNESDAY

On Wednesday we begin the season of Lent, a period of 40 days preparation for the great Paschal Feast. Please do try and come along to Mass on Wednesday to receive the ashes and to begin Lent in the right way. Mass times are 10.00am at St Anthony's and 7.00pm at St Teresa's.

MASS IN ST ALBAN'S SCHOOL

This Tuesday we are invited to join the school community at St Albans for Holy Mass at 10.00am. This will be a full school Mass with tea, coffee and pancakes being available after Mass. The Children will be inviting us to take part in CAFOD's Big Lent Walk. The Children will be walking 200km over 40 days. If you would like to support the children, sponsor forms are available.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

During Lent we are invited to journey with Our Lord to Calvary by making the stations of the Cross. This will take place every Tuesday at 9.00am at St Anthony's and every Friday at 6.30pm at St Teresa's.

LENTEN ALMS

During Lent we will be supporting several charities, all with a particular focus as Catholic Charities. St Cuthbert's Care is our diocesan Charity and all Lenten Alms collections go towards their work here in the diocese supporting many different things that they do. This year in particular they ask that the financial support that we offer goes towards their Young Stars Fostering Group. We will also be supporting CAFOD with their Family Fast Day which takes place on Friday 14th March with the collection being taken on the 15/16th March.

LENT SCRIPTURE COURSE - COME AND SEE

Every Monday throughout Lent we will be holding a Scripture Study Group called 'Come and See'. This will take place in the porch at St Teresa's from 2-3.30pm. Tea and Coffee will be available. Please do come along if you are able to.

A DAY WITH THE LORD & A NIGHT OF LIGHT

On Saturday 15th March we will be holding 'A Day with the Lord', which will conclude with 'A Night of Light'. The Day will begin with an opening Mass at 9.00am followed by Exposition throughout the day. In order to make sure that Jesus is never left alone, a sign up sheet for hour slots can be found in the church porches. It is essential that we have enough volunteers to stay with Jesus throughout the day for this to take place. Please do sign up if your able to pray with Jesus for our parish, our people and our communities. At 7.30pm we will then move into a Night of Light, where the church will be illuminated by candles leading up towards the Blessed Sacrament. We will be inviting people who are passing by St Teresa's to come into Church, to light a candle or to say a prayer.

SUNDAY EVENING VESPERS & BENEDICTION

Every Sunday at 5.00pm at St. Teresa's we have Sung Vespers (Evening Prayer) and Benediction. This time of prayer is such a wonderful opportunity to bring our Sunday to a close, spending time with Jesus in prayer and praise. Please do try and come along if you are able to! It only lasts 35minutes and is such a beautiful service.

And being so far away at the back, they don't know what's happening at the front because they can't see and sometimes can't hear! Please come to the front of the Church, to the seats where your children will be able to see what is going!

THE JUBILEE YEAR - PILGRIMS OF HOPE

The Holy Father has declared 2025 to be a Jubilee Year with the motto and theme "Pilgrims of Hope." It will be a year of pilgrimage and prayer, celebration and reconciliation. "In the course of the year," Pope Francis had written, "every effort should be made to enable the People of God to participate fully in its proclamation of hope in God's grace and in the signs that attest to their efficacy." LEARNING MORE ABOUT THE FAITH THE FIVE SENSES DURING LITURGY

There are various symbols and images within the Liturgy, such as The Cross, the Sign of the Cross, the use of Holy Water, and so on. Over the next few weeks we will examine how during Holy Mass we engage our five senses, sight, smell, touch, sound, and taste. The appeal to the five senses makes worship a tangible, felt experience that orientates the worshiper in the direction of the transcendent.

The Use of Touch

One cannot neglect the **tangible** nature of ritual and worship in the Catholic tradition. Oil is used to confirm Catholics into the church, baptise, to consecrate altars and to bless bells, as well as consecrate bishops and bless the hands of priests. Baptism, namely the literal immersion in water or water being poured over one's head, has a clear tangible feeling to it, just as does anointing a person through applying oil to his or her forehead and palms. There is the joining of hands between the couple during the Sacrament of Matrimony. There is Ordination that has the hands of a bishop being felt on the newly ordained priest's head. When praying the Rosary, Catholics can feel the beads between their fingers during meditation or saying the Hail Mary.

The practice/sacrament of using **Holy Water**, that has been blessed by a priest, bishop, or deacon, and can be used, although more rarely, to expel demons. More common is its use as a symbolic reminder of Baptism. Catholics will, upon entering or leaving a church, dip two right-hand fingers into a cup called a font located on a wall near the church doors and then make the Sign of the Cross by wetting their forehead, breast, and shoulders. Unlike other sacraments and rituals, the use of Holy Water is optional and stands in as a reminder that one is entering the Home of God.

Catholics can often be seen making a gesture in the **Sign of the Cross**. This gesture in the Western Catholic tradition is performed using the right hand to touch the forehead, followed by the middle breast, left shoulder, and then the right shoulder. While gesturing the Catholic will say, "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, Amen." What does The Sign of the Cross symbolise? It symbolises the positive affirmation of the Catholic Church's central doctrine, namely belief in the Holy Trinity of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, as well as the salvation that Christ's death on the cross purchased for humanity.


